

An Inspiring Giff

Sometimes wonderful things just drop in your lap.

This happened last year when I learned that the library was going to receive a significant gift from the estate of Grace F.


Brody. Professor Brody, professor emerita at CWRU's Mandel School of Applied Social Sciences (MSASS), lived on Ormond Road, just up the street from the Lee Road Branch. She died last spring at the age of 91. Her son, William, predeceased her by a few months and was also a frequent library user.

Brody's life was quite an inspiration to us. Widowed at 26, she raised her young son alone while continuing her education, paying for it by giving piano lessons. She earned a bachelor's degree from Columbia University, a master's from the University of Maryland, and a doctorate in psychology from American University. She came to Case Western

Reserve in 1966 and remained until her retirement in 1986. She established the Grace F. Brody Institute for Parent-Child Studies and created a professorship at MSASS. She established a scholarship fund for college-bound student at the Jewish Family Service Association as well.

The focus of her studies was the bond between parents and their children, so it is fitting that her gift to us will be used for a new early literacy family area at Lee Road that will include literacy based toys and resources for children ages 0-5 and their family or caregivers. Similar areas are available at the Noble and Coventry branches, and when it is renovated next year, the University Heights branch will also include an early childhood space.

On December 21 at 7 p.m. we will be naming the children's room at the Lee Road Branch in **Professor Brody's honor.** We welcome the public to come and honor her memory. We hope that others in our community will remember the library as they plan their estates. The Fund for the Future of Heights Libraries can assist with such planning.

Little Heights: Our Family Literacy Playroom at the Library

Enjoy our playroom while building important school readiness skills. Our carefully chosen materials give parents the perfect chance to help their child learn to count, sort, match, and become a confident learner.

Drop-In Play Sessions at Coventry School: Have fun with other families in our playroom filled with fun and interesting toys and play equipment. Run, jump, slide, and spin in our Large Muscle Room! Fees

Baby and Me: The first year of parenthood is filled with many experiences ranging from joy to fear, from delight to frustration. This informal program encourages parents to get acquainted, share challenges and milestones, find support, and gain information from each other and staff.

Parenting Classes: Family Connections runs quarterly parenting workshops. The sessions are usually held in the evenings, and child care and a light meal are provided to make it easier for families to participate. Schedule will be posted at family connections 1.org as soon as it becomes available.

Family School Connection: A neighborhood-based family literacy and engagement program located in all 7 elementary schools in the CH-UH School District. The program's goals are to increase parental engagement in children's education and school; encourage children's literacy and school success by engaging in play-based literacy activities; help families establish routines that include increased conversation, parent child activities, educational play opportunities, and reading time; provide opportunities for parents to get to know and gain support from one another; and familiarize parents with community resources that can help them.


